

The Nordic Church



Local History Group 8 recently visited the Nordic Church in Park Lane. The Church was built in 1883. Gustaf Adolf Kyrka, or the Scandinavian Seamen's Church provided a haven and spiritual home for sailors and migrants from the Nordic countries who were passing through Liverpool.

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Originally run by the Swedish Church Abroad, it was known as the Swedish Church. However, the present day members of the congregation have personal connections with Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden, hence the change of name to Nordic Church in 2013. At that time, the congregation officially joined the Lutheran Church in Great Britain, which is a member of the Porvoo Communion and the Lutheran World Federation. It aims to be a welcoming and inspiring place for those living in Liverpool, whether temporarily, or permanently, all those visiting the city.

The church is also used for music concerts, monthly film nights, language classes, craft group, a Christmas Bazaar and midsummer

and Santa Lucia celebrations. There is also hostel type B&B accommodation available.



The Group was given an interesting talk about the history of the building and the work it has undertaken. We then had time to have a look around the building. There was some interesting art work, photos of pastors of the Church, and two beautiful sculptures by Arthur Dooley. One was of Christ and the other of Mary, which seemed to appeal to Dooley's Irish Catholic sense of humour, especially as Mary is mounted on an reclaimed steel joist he found in the docks and has the letter M inscribed on it!

The Church architecture is very simple, but effective and is based on the traditional Stave churches to be found in Scandinavia. It features a bell which is rung to let people know services are about to begin. We were allowed to have a go and nearly deafened

ourselves!

After a good look around the Church, we were welcomed into the coffee shop where we sat down to a lunch of minestrone soup, a typical Scandinavian open sandwich and a wonderful choice of cakes, served with tea or coffee. This area of the building is used for regular coffee mornings where people can meet for a chat, coffee or a meal and seemed to be well supported by the local community.

All agreed it had been an interesting visit to a place. Many had not realised it existed even though they had lived in Merseyside all their lives!

They have an excellent PA system which can cater for up to six microphones and instruments plus projector and screen. We cannot recommend the venue highly enough to U3A members seeking entertainment, including a delicious



tea, in a warm and highly sociable atmosphere.

Fire & Rescue Service



Local History Group 12 visited the Merseyside Fire & Rescue Service Heritage Centre in Bridle Road, Bootle. We travelled by cars but it is possible to get there by train and bus.

The Heritage Centre is run by volunteer retired fire fighters. The visit commenced with a talk and slide show which took us through the early years of fire fighting up to the present day. The first fire fighters were volunteers from all walks of life especially the police force, and the services were broken up into many small areas, e.g. Southport, Formby, Crosby, Waterloo and Bootle all had individual fire stations and equipment. Fire stations could be anything from stables to warehouses to pub yards, and vehicles in the 1800s were either hand or horse drawn carts. The passage of time brought us to amalgamation of the services and the vehicles we have today, with sophisticated rescue equipment, safety suits and breathing apparatus for the firemen themselves and more effective ways of pumping and accessing water supplies. Our talk and slide show was given by Peter, an engineer and retired fire fighter. There were many interesting anecdotes and wonderful old photographs. There were pictures of the fire at Hendersons in Liverpool which many locals will remember; it was actually in 1960. 11 lives were lost, and it appeared the fire was caused by an electrical fault. The photographs of old Liverpool were especially fascinating depicting early vehicles, fire fighters and fire stations.

Within the building is a collection of fire engines of various ages all sparkling clean and well loved. We were allowed to ding the bells and sound the sirens! There is also a gallery here which houses a lot of memorabilia and early fire fighters uniforms. Again, many interesting anecdotes one of which being in connection with a hat filched

from a German fire fighter on an exchange visit between England and Germany. It so happened that the guy whose hat it was, came to visit the Liverpool museum, spotted the hat, and was able to identify it from the number inside as his very own lost hat, but kindly donated it to the museum in any case; probably had a new one by then! We also learned that there is a great deal of mutual support between fire fighters all over the world which includes inviting the widows and children of the New York fire fighters who lost their lives in 9/11 to spend time in Liverpool.

This visit is to be thoroughly recommended. The coffee, tea and biscuits were excellent, and only £1 per head! There is no charge for the museum but donations are appreciated. A good 2 hours should be allowed to take in the slide show, talk and gallery.

Draft Minutes of the 2016 AGM

Held in the Holy Trinity Hall on the 9th March 2016

Apologies for Absence: Mr & Mrs Manning - Fox, Mr & Mrs Blundell

Minutes of 2015 AGM: Having been circulated in the Newsletter and at the meeting, these were approved nem con and were signed by Andrew Hoare as Chairman.

Matters arising from the minutes: There were no matters arising.

2015 Annual Report: This was approved nem con.

Treasurer's Report : Circulated at the meeting. In the absence of the Treasurer the Chairman related his comments on the report. The year went very much as expected, with no Ballot Costs involved. It was gratifying to see that members have taken some notice of the request to pay only by cheque or standing order. That trend is continuing this year. The balance at year end was £14,204.34, some £2,500 up on last year. Membership was up three! Budget - Apart from colour printing the Newsletter which will probably add c. £800 to the printing costs, he does not foresee any great variance from last year. He could see no need to alter the subs from the present £9 per annum. The meeting accepted his report and the proposition that Alan Thomas continue as Auditor.

The Chairman, thanked two retiring members of the committee, Alan Speakman and Dudley Lidiard, for their work over the years. Following an invitation by the Chair, the new committee introduced themselves to the Meeting. The new Chairman then noted that Chairman Andrew was also leaving the committee after long service, particularly during the disaffiliation discussions. He made a presentation of a Scroll setting out the amount of work Andrew had done.

Any Other Business The committee was asked to investigate an improvement in Speakers on a Wednesday; the hearing loop in the hall, paid for by U3A, was not working; and the lighting on the stage was poor, Group Leaders may wish to buy equipment. The committee will take note.

Woodvale

As you drive down the bypass on your way to Southport and beyond, do you, like us, ever wonder just what happens there today and also of its past? **Local History Group 9** gained an insight when we visited RAF Woodvale. We were greeted by Warrant Office Neil Blair who introduced Station Commander Hooton who not only told us of Woodvale's history but also of its present day activities. In our party, reliving long ago memories, were two past members of an air training corps, both of whom had flown out of Woodvale in their air experience flights.

Woodvale was built on the site of Segar's Farm and part of Freshfield Golf Course and maintains its original triangular airfield. It opened in December 1941 and was



designed for the protection of shipping in and out of Liverpool prior to the May Blitz of 1941. It became the base for Polish Night Fighter Squadrons protecting the busy port. Japan attacked Pearl Harbour in 1941 and the direction of the Second World War changed dramatically, moving the defence operations South. The first recorded enemy aircraft shot down over Woodvale was in May 1942. Woodvale became pivotal in 1942 as it became the Section Control Station for all fighter operations in the North West, based at Broad Lane. Prisoners of War from Europe were flown here to recoup before being transferred elsewhere. Although on a Luftwaffe target map it, because of its camouflage, it was never attacked or bombed. The last RAF Spitfire flew out of Woodvale in 1957.

Present day RAF Woodvale is home to no less than 5 flying training units comprising 1000 cadets from both Liverpool and Manchester Universities; 15 squadrons over 13 sites from far afield as Lancaster down to Staffordshire and North Wales. Air Training units as well as a combined cadet force meet here 3 times a week. Glider planes used to launch from here but Woodvale has moved to powered flights only. Woodvale Owners Aircraft Group operate from here now with 12 privately owned aircraft housed in their own hangar.

At the end of the war Southport Council wanted to buy Woodvale to make a commercial airport, however we all live to tell the tale that that never happened and many local residents have breathed a sigh of relief!

It was a great informative tour and one we can certainly recommend.
