associated with preparing and eating delightful festival foods. As a consequence, we were able to eat our way through the Jewish year. We were wisely advised not to eat a lunch before arriving as, on arrival, we first sampled some tasty bagels, followed by some delicious cakes and were provided with some traditional Jewish recipes to try for ourselves at home.

The Museum is located in a former Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue on Cheetham Hill Road. It is the only Jewish Museum outside London, being in the oldest surviving Synagogue building in Manchester, completed in 1874. The law that Jews cannot drive, or cycle to the synagogue on the Sabbath meant that the synagogue, a beautiful example of Victorian architecture in the Moorish style with splendid stained glass windows and the distinctive cast-iron fittings, became disused as the Jewish community gradually moved out of the area.

Windermere

RAF Woodvale

Members of Formby **Local History Group 7** were given a talk on the history of RAF Woodvale Aerodrome and a tour of the aeroplane hanger. Prior to the visit a list of members wanting to attend the tour, had been given to Warrant Officer Neil Blair, so on arrival at the base everyone was given a name tag for security purposes. Following coffee we were given an introduction to the Aerodrome by the Station Commander, after which, W.O. Blair gave a very entertaining presentation on the history of the facility.

The area currently occupied by the aerodrome was originally a 9 hole golf course in the south and a farm in the north. The base was operational from December 1941 until 1945. It was interesting to note that the dual-carriageway from Southport to Formby was built before the aerodrome. The area to the east of the carriageway, (now occupied by the Formby Hall golf course), was also part of the aerodrome and used to house personnel and stores. There were 42 operational aircraft on the site during the war. As well as UK RAF personnel on the Station there was a large contingent of Polish airmen and about 500 WAAF's, some of whom were employed in the command post monitoring aircraft flights.

Between 1953 and 1957 a Spitfire was used to collect temperature and humidity data for the Met Office. This plane was superseded by a Meteor which flew between 1958 and 1971. The Spitfire was overhauled and is now part of the Historic Aircraft Flight as one of the longest serving aircraft. Most of the buildings on the aerodrome had been built of asbestos cement. When these buildings were demolished most of the rubble was buried on the site together with bits of old aircraft and metal.

RAF Woodvale is an operational station which is also used to train students from Liverpool and Manchester Universities who want to learn to fly. The RAF also encourage them to join the airforce, and are apparently very successful. The students fly GROB Tutor T Mk 1 trainer aircraft. These aircraft were seen during the visit to the aircraft hanger. There is also a Woodvale Aircraft Owners Group (WAOG), on the site that facilitates about 12 private aircraft housed in their own hanger.

The visit lasted about two and half hours and was very interesting and enjoyable. After the tour we had lunch in the Pinewoods Pub.
