The heavy rain did not dampen our spirits as 30 **Amblers Group One** members boarded the coach at Cross Green for Skipton. The scenic route was still beautiful: lush green with no sign of Autumn leaves: many fields with huge flooded areas: cows and sheep grazing: dry stone walls and magnificent changing clouds and occasional glimpses of blue. We welcomed our lunch break at Oswaldtwistle Mill with time for a retail therapy browse: several of us clutching bargain bags as we set off for Haworth. We arrived in sunshine and time to visit the Church with it's memorial brass to mark

the spot where the Bronte Family are buried, apart from Anne who died in Scarborough and is buried there. The views across the moors were very impressive especially as the weather had improved and we reached our hotel in bright sun! Several of our group had stayed at the Rendezvous on previous U3A holidays organised by Jean. We were welcomed by the Senior Hotel Manager. The hotel stands beside the tow path of the Leeds Liverpool Canal, one mile from the centre of Skipton. The Dining Room overlooks this too with wonderful views across to moorland. The food was good with a wide choice of menu each night and the breakfast buffet's full range was sufficient to satisfy everyone. The staff were all

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very friendly.

Our Tuesday visit was to Saltaire, the amazing village built between 1851 and 1876 by its founder Sir Titus Salt, who made his fortune in the Bradford woollen textile industry. He developed the entire village on classical lines to house his workers. Each house had a water supply, gas lighting, an outside privy and a good living space. Higher paid workers had better houses with small front gardens. There were allotments and areas for recreation, Almshouses and a Hospital. The United Reformed Church is now a Grade 1 listed building. Sadly this was not open for us to look inside. The Mill now houses the work of David Hockney who was born in Bradford, and also a vast range of Art Works, Ceramics, Books and Artist materials, Business Offices and of course a Coffee shop on the top floor. After a coffee break, two of us in the lift had a few anxious moments finding the level to exit! We followed the Town Trail and walked the streets of the Mill workers with the majestic Mill always a landmark. Sir Titus Salt, a man ahead of his time in caring for his workers, as was Lord Leverhume with Port Sunlight and Cadbury at Bourneville. In the afternoon we drove through Otley, famous for Thomas Chippendale and his Georgian furniture, to Ilkley, when Jean valiantly led us in singing "On Ilkley Moor B'ah Tat"! Never mind the rain again. We explored the town and time to shop.

On Wednesday to Skipton on Market day. Not many Stalls "due to the rain" one Trader told me as he stood back under his dripping awning. The Markets Charter goes back to Medieval times when the Castle granted the holding of a "fair" to trade sheep. Plenty to explore, especially the newly developed Craven Court shopping Arcade, a narrow cobbled street like the Shambles in York, dating back to the 16th century theatre. Now a glass roof covers rows of shops and cafes with a wrought iron gallery. The Town Hall, with its Craft Fair, The Church and Castle and the many little side streets with references to trades, Sheep street, the importance of the Canal and its Basin gave us lots of walking. On to Grassington and its steeply cobbled Square with its surprising Museum. Housed in two original cottages dated 1728 it is astonishing how much history can be packed in: Farming: Mills: Mining. We also discovered a shop displaying clothes and materials from the early 1900's and memories of "We had that" or "my parents wore that".

Our final day was to Harrogate in dazzling sunshine, with the option to spend the time at Harlow Carr RHS gardens and be picked up later. So much to choose in the lovely Spa Town. Several enjoyed a stroll through the Valley Gardens with its glorious trees, colourful flower beds and water features and a coffee house. The Royal Pump Room opposite the gates was well worth a visit. Then a very steep climb up Montpellier Hill, hoping for lunch in the famous Betty's to find the Queue way out of the door! No chance. But we did find a delightful Olde Worlde Tea Room in the Antiques quarter of Montpellier. Back to pick up the group at Harlow Carr. they had enjoyed the gardens in sunshine. back via Knaresborough and its Market Square with "Ye Olde" Chemist shop dating back to 1720 and finally closing as a Chemist in 1997. A very scenic route back to Skipton when the temperature dropped from 17 C down to 8 C with lashing rain and aquaplaning through deep puddles as we came over the highest moors. We reached the hotel in sunshine and those who had fallen

asleep missed all the fun!.

And so we headed for home on Friday with a coffee stop at Huntley Farm Shop. when Jean nobly got out to lead Paul all round the Outlet Buildings to find a suitable parking space. A voice from the front said Jean was doing a sponsored walk as she carefully picked her way round huge puddles!

As a group, we all say thank you to Jean for another carefully planned and interesting holiday. So many people have told me how lucky we are and such good company too. Thank you too Jean's helpers. Paul our Driver said how much he had enjoyed being with us and for making him so welcome. What more can I say but thank you again Jean.

Paradise Mills

Paradise Mill demonstrates the early 20th century, when Macclesfield possessed the only working Jacquard silk hand looms in the country. **Local History Group 6** members drove to the mill which continued working until 1981, when the firm went into liquidation. Work subsequently began to restore the machinery to working order with the idea of opening a working museum where silk is again woven on the old handlooms. The Grade II listed building now contains 26 restored Jacquard looms, along with designers' and managers' offices and our guides demonstrated various pieces of mill machinery, including the Jacquard loom, as well as telling us much about the industry and the people who worked in it.

The adjacent Silk Museum is housed in the original School of Art. The School was founded with the original aim of educating practical designers for the manufacture of silk, but it later went on to offer a more general art education and gained a reputation for producing high quality work. Today the museum examines the properties of silk, how it is woven, printed and coloured and introduces visitors to some of the well-known Macclesfield silk manufacturers and their looms, along with silk escape maps and parachutes which helped to win World War II.



Silk weaving was introduced into



Macclesfield when Huguenot weavers were brought into the area. Hand silk weaving prospered when Britain was at war with France at the end of the 18th Century. The power-driven looms were perfected in the 1830s and were incorporated into existing buildings, but were only suitable for coarse broad cloths. Hand looms continued to be used for the finest silks and the complex Jacquard work. By 1850 Macclesfield had become known as 'the silk town' and local firms exhibited calcees, bandanna handkerchiefs, velvets, satins ribbons and shawls at the Great Exhibition. The prominent silk families were also prominent in civic and religious life and were keen non-conformists, building chapels for their workers and paying for the education of the poor.



Macclesfield Sunday School was founded and the large building that now housing the Heritage Centre formally taught 2,500 children each year on their one-day off from work. The technical skills that an apprentice required were provided by a Technical School.

After an excellent and informative visit the group adjourned to a nearby eating establishment.
