Members of **Local History Group 7** recently visited the Catalyst Museum in Widnes. The museum is the only museum in the UK which explores the science and technology behind the chemical industry. The

museum also looks at the impact of chemicals on our lives, past and present by providing hands-on exhibits, activities, demonstrations and a variety of interesting talks.

We all shared cars to travel to the museum which took about 40 minutes. After coffee/tea and biscuits we were taken to the conference theatre and given a talk by Dr Diane Leitch, on the "Development of the Chemical Industry in Runcorn and Widnes in the 19th and 20th centuries". A lot of local history information was provided in the talk, which follows on from our visit to the Salt Mines in Cheshire.

After lunch in the museum's café, we were split into two groups. One group was taken to the

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rooftop Observatory Gallery where we enjoyed panoramic views of the Mersey Gateway Bridge and across to Cheshire. We were also provided with tablets which showed pictures of historical views of Widnes, Runcorn, the river and the ship canal, together with historical information.

The other group were shown around the museum section called "The Birth of an Industry" - the Chemical Industry. This was very interesting and showed the conditions that people had to endure. The Industry has come a long way to the present day.

The visit was very interesting and enjoyable and lasted from 10:30 am to about 3:00 pm. They also had a small shop which had some interesting things to buy for the grandchildren.

Data Protection

New Data Protection legislation has come into force. Earlier this year the Committee set up a Sub-Committee to develop Formby U3A's response. Working on advice promulgated by the Third Age Trust in late January we were well on the way to agreeing appropriate approaches and policies. The Third Age Trust radically changed its advice on April 24. We had briefed Group Leaders and put a short note in the April Newsletter indicating that we would shortly be writing to ask for your consent to keep and use personal information for membership purposes. The note was replaced in the electronic versions of the Newsletter but it was too late to change the printed copy so we apologise for any confusion.

The Sub-Committee is reviewing the new advice and will be producing a revised Privacy Policy and a Data Protection Policy for consideration by the whole Committee. Once agreed these will be placed on the website and be available on request from the Secretary. It appears we will not need your consent to keep and use your personal information for membership purposes and our policies will explain how we use and keep your information. We will also be issuing guidance to Group Leaders.

The Committee would like to assure you that we are taking Data Protection and Privacy very seriously. We have reviewed and strengthened our systems to ensure that we still keep and handle your information securely.

In the meantime there are a couple of things we would like to bring to your attention. Photographs are personal information and we have already asked contributors to the Newsletter to ensure that members in Group Photographs are aware that it is being taken for the Newsletter and will appear on the website. Members thus have an opportunity not to be included in the photograph. Secondly it is good practice to use bcc (blind carbon copy) when circulating an email to a large group of people as this means that private e-mail addresses cannot be seen by anyone else, thus retaining members' privacy. However if everyone in the Group agrees then email addresses can be shared but individual members should still be given the opportunity to remain bcc.

We will keep you informed of progress on the website, in the newsletter and at our monthly meetings.

Newsletter Editor's Footnote: Please do not ask the Newsletter Editor, or any of the Committee Members for another member's e-mail address, 'phone number etc. Our refusal is not intended to cause offence but is simply us protecting Formby U3A from substantial fines that we could incur if we disclose such personal details.

THE ANCIENT CHAPEL OF HOLY ROOD, MELLING

Local History Group 9 visited this ancient chapel on 10 May and what a little gem it is! Now known as The Parish of St Thomas, Melling, tucked away not so far from Formby in a semi-rural area, we stepped back in time as we listened to the very interesting and informative talk given by Barbara Nickson, Church Secretary.

The earliest recorded entry of worship on the site is 1190. The chapel was dedicated to Holy Rood (meaning cross) and there is the base of a stone cross in the ancient churchyard which is thought to be the base of a “preaching cross” before the church was built. There has been a burial ground here since 600 AD. Norse settlers came to Lancashire about 900 AD and left behind evidence of Christian activity.

The old chapel lasted 650 years and over time fell into disrepair. In the early eighteen hundreds it was decided to build a new church on the site and Reverend Miles Formby who was responsible for building the new church, preached the first sermon on a Sunday in March 1835. As the years have gone by, its original design has been modified from an open timbered early Gothic interior to as it is today, with graceful triple lancet windows. The old tower to the west end was surmounted by four canopied turrets. A new organ was installed and a vestry and additions have been designed in the early English style.

Several fine memorials which had been fixed in the Old Chapel dedicated to noteworthy local parishioners in the 1700/early1800s have been refixed on the walls of the “new” church including memorials to the Molyneux family and to The Reverend Miles Formby, the fourth son of Richard Formby of Formby Hall who died in 1849.

At the entrance to the church we noted the Lych Gate which was erected in 1921 to honour those from Melling who had died in the Great War. Two bronze tablets naming those who had fallen in both World Wars are displayed in the church.

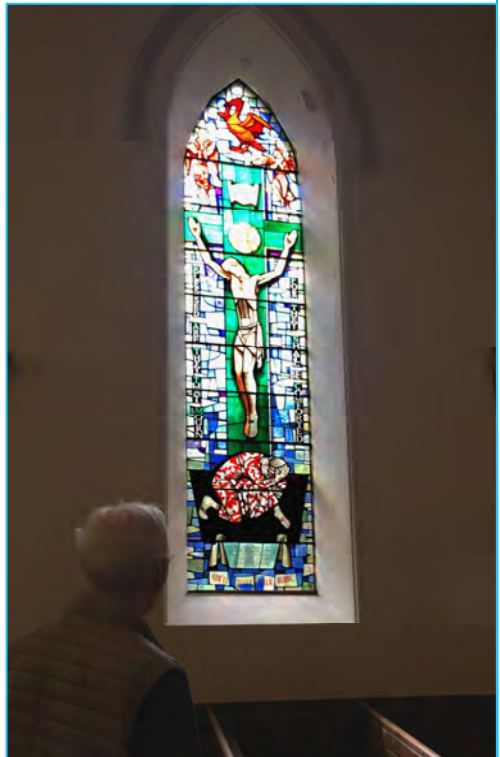
Further down the lane Barbara took us to the Tithebarn which was built in 1660 and originally used to store the “tithes” that was payable to the Rector of Halsall. Over the centuries the use of the barn has been modified from storing grain to becoming a coach house for the vicarage, parish rooms and a community hall. In 1962 it served as a dining room to little local school and is now a tastefully renovated venue used for weddings and local events.





The original school, built in 1720 comprised of two white cottages on Tithebarn Lane. It provided basic education for the children of Melling which included 25 “free” children and others who paid, with special provision made for poor children through special trusts administered by the a local family named Tatlock. When the numbers increased to over 100 children, Reverend Miles Formby pushed for a replacement building which was opened in 1844. New school premises in Wheeler Drive now serves Melling and the local area.

With our thanks to Barbara, we truly stepped back in time and thoroughly enjoyed our experience.

Outings are open to all paid up members of the U3A. All we ask is that you have the ability to get on and off the coach independently. We cannot be responsible for providing assistance. The coach can accommodate mobility aids which are kept in the luggage compartment on the bus.

Owing to increased demand, we cannot reserve tickets: **Tickets will be allocated on a first come and paid for – first reserved basis.** A separate cheque is required for each outing and **it is essential that members include their telephone number with each booking.** Several cheques have been received with no information and I have struggled to identify what they are for. If no contact details are provided, I am unable to contact people when outings are fully booked.

Bookings and information are available at U3A monthly meetings, or coffee mornings. Tuesday June 26th, Llanberis and Snowdonia. £41 each includes return coach journey with a brief stop at Tweed Mills. The event attracts thousands of visitors to see the parade and visit the many attractions including stalls along the streets. Wednesday August 22nd, Whitby. Tickets £18 each includes coach and gratuities. Enjoy a day walking along the harbour, or take the open top, hop on hop off bus to the Abbey and enjoy the views. **Refreshments not included** but you can visit the many restaurants along the sea front. Depart Cross Green at 9:00am.

Friday September 14th, Saltaire. Tickets £21 each include entrance and tour by guides in period costumes of this UNESCO World Heritage site model village created by Sir Titus Salt, including the Mill, Victoria Hall and church. Admire the beautiful architecture of the original factory opened 1853, the David Hockney Galleries, or stroll along the canal towpath or wander the nearby parks. This week there are additional attractions including the Saltaire Festival.

Meals are not included as Saltaire has a great selection of places to eat and drink. Depart Cross Green at 9:00am.
