Local History Group 8's visit to Liverpool Central Library and Record Office tied in well with the members meeting talk the next week on William Brown, "the man who made Liverpool". Of course the library is on William Brown Street along with the World Museum and the Walker Art Gallery and it was Brown who funded the original library building. The building itself is well worth seeing: behind the original façade there is the very modern part, completed in 2013, with its splendid light rounded atrium and then there are the equally splendid original wood-panelled Picton Reading Room and Hornby Oak Room. The modern part had already been rebuilt once having been

bombed in the Liverpool blitz.

The Oak Room contains a number of rare and valuable books. One of the most valuable is a book of beautiful prints of birds by the naturalist and illustrator John James Audubon. Only 120 copies are known to have survived in the world and another is in the Victoria Gallery and Museum in Liverpool, which our group also visited recently.

But the real highlight was the tour of the records office and archive by Carl, a qualified archivist. There is the public area, which seems pretty well

used, where there is free access to material such as family history websites, local newspapers on microfiche. People were even looking at real books! Then there is another archive room which the public can access by prior appointment so that staff can have prepared access to whatever material they have requested.

We were lucky enough to go behind the scenes to see some of the vast array of books, papers, letters, charts, maps, graphics etc. which make up the archive. The members of the group were very taken with the stacks of storage shelves and drawers which can be electronically moved up against each other or moved apart to give access. It seemed very easy to get lost amongst it all, but the storage areas are colour-coded so at least you'd know what floor you were lost on! The archive contains material mostly relating to the city of Liverpool but also some relating to the wider Merseyside area and other parts of Lancashire. Some of it is so precious and fragile that it has to be kept in temperature-controlled rooms, which we also entered, but briefly, brrrr!



As the final part of the tour, Carl had set out for us a number of examples of the amazing range of what is in the archive and the group found this the most fascinating part of all. There was a ledger relating to the trade in slaves showing the prices of individuals; illustrations and records of the workhouse which was one of the largest in the country, covering much of the length of Brownlow Hill; a letter from Queen Victoria; football programmes (one with a red banner, one blue) from the days when, we were amazed to discover, Liverpool and Everton shared them; the oldest document in the archive was the charter from King John which allowed Liverpool to hold a market.

Of course it's not much use having all the material unless you can retrieve it and make use of it. But archiving methods and systems change over time so it's a constant challenge to keep the database of what you have up to date and for all your material to be accessible. And developing technology makes all that even more of a challenge.

We ended the visit with walking on to the roof from which there are great views of the Liverpool skyline, and solving the riddle which comes from one of the large rare books in the Oak Room, the *Genus Crocus* by George Maw, which has a single eye in the binding. Next time you are in William Brown Street see if you can solve it by seeing what is spelt out by the red letters amongst the book titles which are set into the library's entrance-way.

I personally took two things from this fascinating trip, and I suspect other members did too. Firstly, I discovered that the whole business of archiving is much more interesting than you'd think it would be and secondly, the library and the archive is a great and precious resource for the city and we should all do our best for it to remain so.

St Peter's Church

Local History Group 16 were entertained to a tour around St Peter's Church and graveyard by Father Ted. The visit coincided with the Christmas Tree Festival which featured decorated trees sponsored by the local people and organisations. Local charities benefitted by visitor donations.

The church at its current site was built in 1746 to replace a former chapel located



nearer the sea and destroyed by a storm in 1739. The new church was of Georgian design with an extension, including the Formby Chapel having a Gothic style added in the 1870's. This leaves an interesting building with two contrasting architectural styles. Father Ted explained the history of the church, especially the influence of the Formby family.



Outside we were treated to stories about some of the local people buried in the graveyard. After a very informative and entertaining talk the group retired to the Bier House for refreshments. Many thanks to Tricia for organising the visit.
