CHET & Crosby Hall

Members of **Local History Group 7** recently visited CHET and Crosby Hall in Little Crosby. The visit was organised by David and Glennis Poole. We all met in the Cross House, Formby, for lunch and then shared cars for the drive to the Crosby Hall Educational Centre (CHET), located off Back Lane, Little Crosby. We were met by the Manager of CHET who gave the group an overview of the unit. CHET provides day and residential courses for Primary/Junior School children. There are a number of such establisments up and down the country that give children experiences in a variety of activities, for example: craft, orienteering, rafting, climbing, archery, environmental issues, nature, etc.

We were then met by Mark Blundell, the present head of the Blundell family, and the current Lord-Lieutenant of Merseyside. The Blundell family have been in existence since the Middle Ages and were Royalists during the Civil War. The family were also

devout Catholics. The present Crosby Hall was thought to have been in existence from about 1609 and extensive modifications carried out in about 1785. Mark showed the group around the ground floor of Crosby Hall and talked about his family history and about the diaries of Nicholas Blundell, a book that provides a wealth of information about life in the early 18th Century.



The visit was thoroughly enjoyed by the group. CHET organise events during the summer months which are usually sold out well in advance.

Birkenhead Priory

Unfortunately **Local History Group 6** members were unable to "ferry across the Mersey" when they recently visited Birkenhead. Woodside Terminal is closed until 2025! The visit proved an eye-opener for all; nobody had previously visited this, the oldest site in Merseyside. Birkenhead, named from the old English Bircen Heafod, meaning Headland Growing Birch Trees is famous for Cammell Laird Shipyard which

now adjoins Birkenhead Priory, our destination. The Priory is of such historical significance that it is classed in the same category as Stonehenge and reflects the spiritual importance of the Wirral, having been established by Hamon de Massey in the 13th Century.

It's not easy to interpret and decide exactly how the Priory would have looked when it was active as although there are significant ruins, more so than at Norton, much has disappeared, some to make way for the dry dock which abuts the site. In addition, the Victorians made



alterations as they attempted to preserve it. However, such is the historical significance of the site that ships brought in for maintenance cannot be spray painted but have to be hand-painted by roller. The Great Hall accommodated visitors waiting for the monks' twice daily ferry to row them across the Mersey. One window would have been the place for handing out alms, charitable donations to the poor. The Chapter House remains intact, its name coming from the fact that one chapter from the Rule of St Benedict was read each morning to instruct and remind the monks and the staff of their duties and responsibilities. The House has the original arched ceiling which no modern day stone-mason has yet admitted to having the skill to replicate. It was the heart of everyday business at the Priory, with meetings held in the round to sort all the practical considerations about the life of the monastery and the estate. Edward I held an important meeting there to determine the Welsh border. The Priory was closed in 1536 and the Chapter House eventually became a chapel. It remains a consecrated Church of England chapel, hosting regular church services, weddings, baptisms and funerals, complete with some spectacular stained glass.

The Undercroft houses a small and interesting museum which tells the story of the Priory. The stone floor is still visible either side of the present timber walkway. A spiral staircase leads up the Refectory above the Undercroft, now covered with an award winning roof, the space hosting Sunday Concerts throughout the summer.

St Mary's, the first parish church of Birkenhead, shares the site with the Priory. It survives now as only a tower and spire, having been demolished in the 1970's. Several members climbed the 101 steps of the tower for spectacular views of the River Mersey and Camel Lairds. The tower is now dedicated as a memorial to the 99 men lost in the 1939 disaster aboard the Laird's built submarine HMS Thetis.

Birkenhead Council, now part of Wirral Council, many years ago signed an agreement to maintain the Priory in perpetuity. Our thanks go to Samantha, our guide for her enthusiastic and insightful tour of the site.

More information is available on YouTube an online talk called The Story of RAF Woodvale from The Atkinson.

After the presentation we were taken outside to see the aircraft that currently use Woodvale for training purposes. We were lucky enough to have a very close look inside the aircraft.

We finished the visit by looking in the Operations Room and were amazed by the amount of detail involved in running the airfield.

The chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced the committee. There being 67 members attending, the quorum requirements for the AGM to take place were met.

Apologies for absence were received from: Jean Horne, Dave Goodwill, Noel Blundell, Graham Higley, Kitt Robinson and Cathy Robinson.

The chairman explained that the formal aspects of the AGM would take place first, to be followed by a presentation from this month's Speaker.

Approval of Minutes of the 2023 AGM:

Draft minutes have been published in the Spring 2024 Newsletter and on the website. There being no matters arising from these minutes, their approval was proposed by Martyn Rodmell and seconded by Andrew Hoare. The minutes were agreed by the meeting and will be signed by the chairman, Helen Lewandowska, as being approved.

To receive and approve the Annual Report:

The Chairman presented her report on the activity within Formby u3a in the past 12 months. Highlights included;

The continued popularity of both the coffee morning events and Speakers meetings each month;

The resurrection of the arranged trips, with popular trips to Llandudno and Harrogate. Due to their success work is in hand arrange further trips for the coming year;

The Christmas concert arranged by our music groups proved very popular and very successful, and feedback has been extremely positive. The recorder group put our u3a on the regional map by arranging a a regional recorder day attended by over 30 players.

A number of new groups have started in the year which was very much welcomed. Overall we have 75 active groups at present with the six new groups starting and 2 closing during the year.

The newsletters continue to be published but the decision was made to reduce the frequency to quarterly (from monthly) to ensure there was adequate content.

The Chair expressed her particular thanks to Kitty and her team (coffee morning catering), Keith Jacques (puzzles and books), Noel Blundell (Webmaster) and Dave Goodwill (Newsletter) for their continued support during the year. The Chair closed with a small presentation to Anne and Martyn Rodmell, who are both leaving the committee, in recognition of their sterling work as treasurer (5 years!) and Speaker's Secretary respectively.

To receive and approve the Treasurer's Report and Independently Reviewed Accounts for the year ending 31st December 2023:

The Treasurer reported on the financial statements highlighting the principal sources of income (membership subscriptions) and expenditure. Accounts were prepared on Receipts and Payments basis. She ran through the figures in the report, highlighting the significant areas of expenditure. Overall, the surplus for the year was £92 (£1,165.00 in 2022), with accumulated reserves of £18,591 (£18,499 in 2022).

Approval of the accounts was proposed by Andrew Dickinson, seconded by Michael Lewandowski, and approved by the members present, with no objections, no abstentions.

To Appoint an Independent Examiner of accounts:

The meeting was advised that our past reviewer, Kit Robinson was standing down and that Mr David Poole was being proposed as his replacement. This was formally proposed by Martyn Rodmell and seconded by Peter Kehoe. The proposal was agreed by the members present, there were no objections or abstentions. The Treasurer extended the thanks of the Committee to Kit for all his work as our Independent Reviewer in recent years.

To receive and approve submitted Resolutions.

The Secretary confirmed that no Resolutions had been received for the meeting.
